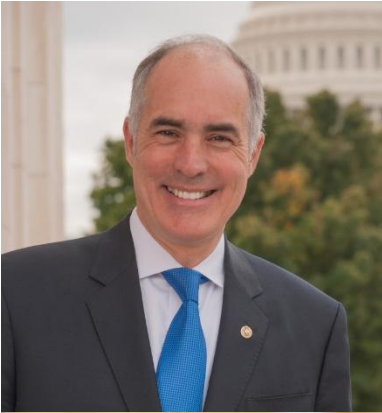


2018 Democratic Candidates on Tredyffrin Township's May 15 Primary Ballot

Tom Wolf for Governor of Pennsylvania: First elected in 2014, Tom is running for re-election. He has battled a Republican majority in both the state House and Senate for adequate funding for education, social services, infrastructure and fair elections. He fully restored the \$1 billion cut to education made under the Corbett administration. He was at the forefront in the battle to secure a fair congressional map for Pennsylvania and will fight to end gerrymandering. He will continue to stand up to Donald Trump's attempts to gut Medicaid, increase premiums, charge seniors an age tax, and strip coverage from people with pre-existing conditions, women, and seniors. He is committed to commonsense gun safety reform, criminal justice reform and 21st century voting reforms. He supports the permanent ban of hydraulic fracturing for oil and gas in the Delaware River Basin and has stood up to Trump's proposed cuts to the Environmental Protection Agency. Governor Wolf signed a bill that legalized medical marijuana. He secured funding for 45 treatment centers that will treat more than 11,000 individuals for substance use disorder. He provided health care to over 125,000 individuals suffering from addiction, by expanding Medicaid. Kathi Cozzone for Lieutenant Governor: PA is one of 18 states that provides for the election of a lieutenant governor, who also serves as president of the Pa. Senate. For 11 years, Kathi has served as one of Chester County's three commissioners and the only Democrat. She views serving as lieutenant governor as an opportunity to not only make the legislature more aware of its effect on local governments but to continue the work she's started in Chester County. That includes workforce development, keeping non-violent offenders with a mental illness out of the criminal justice system and fighting for pipeline reform. Kathi was appointed by Governor Wolf to his Pipeline Infrastructure Task Force, and will advocate for recommendations made in that body's report. When it comes to the state's budget quagmire, Kathi believes she can reach across the aisle. With a background in

Melissa Shusterman for PA Representative for the 157th

PA Democratic State Committee: Every 4 years, voters elect EIGHT representatives from Chester County to represent them on the state's Democratic Committee. **The Democratic State Committee is the governing body of the Pennsylvania Democratic Party.** Founded in 1792, the Committee is responsible for promoting the guiding principles and core values of the Party. The PADSD meet three times each year. They hold nominating conventions for statewide candidates, pass and promote a platform, and pass resolutions. The professional staff raises money and coordinates strategies to elect Democrats up and down the ballot across the Commonwealth. On Primary Day, look for information at the polls with brief biographies of all **18 candidates** on the ballot.
